Notwithstanding an assertion to the contrary which has found its way into several leading works of reference, Reinhart Dozy's *Histoire des Musulmans*

d'Espagne - originally published in 1861 - has never been reprinted, and, having consequently become scarce and costly, is little known except to historical specialists. The reason why no second edition was issued of a book at once so brilliant and so profound will be made apparent in the Biographical Introduction; it is here only necessary to record the fact. In 1874, however, a German translation of the *Histoire* was made under the direction of Dr. Wolf Wilhelm, Graf von Baudissin, and this version, to which Dozy contributed some emendations of the original, has frequently been consulted during the preparation of the present volume: a Spanish version (by F. de Castro, late Professor of Spanish History in the

University of Seville), published in 1877, has also occasionally been found useful for purposes of reference. In 1881, two years before the historian's death, there appeared the Third Edition - corrected and considerably enlarged - of his *Recherches sur l'Histoire et la Litterature de l'Espagne pendant le moyen age*: from this work, which is of the highest value to the student of early Spanish history, supplementary notes have been selected, and in some cases additions and corrections thence derived have been embodied in the text. The present translation is entirely unabridged, and aims at being faithful without being baldly literal: the footnotes have been modified by the omission of those which appealed

essentially to Arabic scholars, and the substitution of others of more general interest - selected mainly from the historian's own works and more recent sources. There can be no doubt that Christianity was brought very early into Spain by the preaching, as is supposed, of St Paul himself, who is said to have made a missionary journey through Andalusia, Valencia, and Aragon. On the other hand,

there are no grounds whatever for supposing that James, the brother of John, ever set foot in Spain. The "invention" of his remains at Ira Flavia in the 9th century, together with the story framed to account for their presence in a remote corner of Spain so far from the scene of the Apostle's martyrdom, is a fable too childish to need refutation. The Gothic domination lasted 300 years, and in that comparatively short period we are asked by some writers to believe that the invaders quite lost their national characteristics, and became, like the Spaniards, luxurious and effeminate. Their haughty exclusiveness, and the fact of their being Arians, may no doubt have tended to keep them for a time separate from, and superior to, the subject population, whom they despised as slaves, and hated as heretics. But when the religious barrier was removed, the social one soon followed, and so completely did the conquerors lose their ascendancy, that they even surrendered their own Teutonic tongue for the corrupt Latin of their subjects. On the whole it may be said that the Saracen conquest was accomplished with wonderfully little bloodshed, and with

few or none of those atrocities which generally characterize the subjugation of a whole people by men of an alien race and an alien creed. It cannot, however, be denied that the only contemporary Christian chronicler is at variance on this point with all the Arab accounts.
