Ich rauche nicht, esse wenig Fleisch, treibe Sport (aber nicht zu exzessiv) und achte meist auf eine gute Work-Life-Balance, wie man heute so schön sagt. Und nicht nur in Zeiten von Covid-19 bleibe ich zu Hause, wenn ich mich krank fühle. Dass ich mein ganzes Leben schon vernünftig war, kann ich dagegen nicht behaupten. Trotz Bronchitis in die verqualmte Diskothek, überbordendes Feiern während der Studentenzeit oder riskante Kletterpartien ohne Sicherung auf Gletschermoränen und Felsen auf Forschungsexkursionen – dies alles zeigt, dass Vernunft vor allem eine Frage der Lebenserfahrung ist. Allerdings schützt Alter nicht immer vor Unvernunft: Man muss nur die Impfpoten gegen Grippe betrachten, die selbst bei Risikogruppen weit von wünschenswerten Zahlen entfernt sind. In unserem Titelthema ab S. 12 stellt mein Kollege Steve Ayan fünf Grundregeln vor, mit denen wir unser rationales Denken fördern und damit der Vernunft zum Durchbruch verhelfen können. Eine davon betrifft die Medien: Sie, liebe Leserinnen und Leser, schenken uns Vertrauen, denn Sie lesen dieses Heft, was wir durch unsere sachliche Berichterstattung hoffentlich hundertprozentig rechtfertigen. Dieses Kriterium mag Ihnen bei der Entscheidung helfen, auf welche anderen Medien Sie sich verlassen können: "Alarmismus, Schuldzuweisungen und Selbstlob sind Merkmale derer, die es mit der Objektivität nicht so genau nehmen", schreibt Ayan. Ein Blick in die Echokammern der sozialen Medien bestätigt die Einschätzung, gerade in so aufgeregten Zeiten wie diesen. Der wichtigste Tipp ist daher, Ruhe zu bewahren: Panik war schon immer ein schlechter Ratgeber – sei es im Umgang mit neuartigen Viren, dem Klimawandel oder "nur" mit schlechten Schulnoten des eigenen Kindes. Rational wäre es dagegen, sich regelmäßig die Hände zu waschen, weniger Auto zu fahren, den Fleischkonsum zu reduzieren und mit dem Nachwuchs sachlich zu reden, wo es konkrete Probleme in der Schule gibt, und diese dann gezielt anzugehen. In diesem Sinne: Bleiben Sie vernünftig und lassen Sie sich nicht von der allgemeinen Aufgeregtheit anstecken! Herzlich Ihr Daniel Lingenhöhl, Chefredakteur.

Late life is characterized by great diversity in memory and other cognitive functions. Although a substantial proportion of older adults suffer from Alzheimer's disease or another form of dementia, a majority retain a high level of cognitive skills throughout the life span. Identifying factors that sustain and enhance cognitive well-being is a growing area of original and translational research. In 2009, there are as many as 5.2 million Americans living with Alzheimer's disease, and that figure is expected to grow to as many as 16 million by 2050. One in six women and one in 10 men who live to be at least age 55 will develop Alzheimer's disease in their remaining lifetime. Approximately 10 million of the 78 million baby boomers who were alive in 2008 can expect to develop Alzheimer's disease. Seventy percent of people with Alzheimer's disease live at home, cared for by family and friends. In 2008, 9.8 million family members, friends, and neighbors provided unpaid care for someone with Alzheimer's disease or another form of dementia. The direct costs to Medicare and Medicaid for care of people with Alzheimer's disease amount to more than \$148 billion annually

(from Alzheimer's Association, 2008 Alzheimer's Disease Facts and Figures). This book will highlight the research foundations behind brain fitness interventions as well as showcase innovative community-based programs to maintain and promote mental fitness and intervene with adults with cognitive impairment. The emphasis is on illustrating the nuts and bolts of setting up and utilizing cognitive health programs in the community, not just the laboratory.

Karl Barth is widely regarded as the most important theologian of the twentieth century, and his observations about the church and its place in a modern world continue to engage religious scholars nearly fifty years after his death. This English translation of the Swiss-published *Conversations* is a three-volume collection featuring correspondence, articles, interviews, and other short-form writings by Barth from 1959-1962. Among them are dialogues with representatives of the Evangelical Community Movement (1959); conversations with prison chaplains and a question-and-answer session with the Conference of the World Student Christian Federation (1960); discussions with Methodist preachers, Zurich pastors, and Catholic students of theology (1961); press conferences in New York and Chicago (1962); and an interview at the United Nations (1962). Within these pages, scholars and students will find a comprehensive view into Barth's life and thinking about theology and its role in society today.

The second volume of inscriptions from Ankara, ancient Ancyra, contains editions with commentary and full illustration of nearly two hundred inscriptions from the late Roman and Byzantine periods, and forty texts of Roman imperial date, more than half of which have not been published before, as well as inscriptions for Ancyrans found outside the city dating from the Hellenistic period to late antiquity. The inscriptions are introduced by a new survey of Ankara's history from the third to the tenth centuries. An important group of inscriptions documents the building of Ancyra's city walls. A new text suggests that the late Roman fortifications were erected in 267. The city was strategically and politically prominent in the fourth century, when it served as an imperial residence. After the mid-fifth century Ankara's population was overwhelmingly Christian, and the city had a large monastic population. A monumental inscription states that Ancyra was called the city of the Theotokos. Three lengthy inscriptions present a remarkable collection of biblical and quasi-biblical exempla, depicting the lives of Old Testament figures as role models for Ancyra's pious inhabitants. Against previous historical reconstructions, it appears that the late Roman city continued to be inhabited after the fall of Ancyra to the Sassanians in 622. The hypothesis that the famous Byzantine citadel dates to the seventh century is rejected in favour of construction in 859, under the emperor Michael III, when Ancyra was hailed as a new Jerusalem. Ancyra enjoyed a revival in the Middle Byzantine period. Inscriptions strengthen the arguments for dating the conversion of the famous imperial temple of Rome and Augustus into a church to the ninth, and the construction of the now destroyed Church of St Clement to the tenth century.

China's Silent Army Schäffer-Poeschel

The publication presents research results on a multitude of knowledge exchange processes in post-enlightenment Europe. These focus on the question in how far deeply rooted processes of knowledge exchange by transnational intellectual discourses and

international expert communities have contributed to a variety of networks of European intellectual identities and research practices. These practices again constitute a fertile framework for de-territorialised and de-nationalised exchange of knowledge that might contribute to contagious processes of emancipation, cooperation as well as problem solving.

The Lost Words Wildfire

To mark the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation, Paul Hacker's landmark study *Faith in Luther: Martin Luther and the Origin of Anthropocentric Religion* appears now in a new English edition. Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, in his final memoir in 2016, remembers Paul Hacker as "a great master, someone with an unbelievably broad education, someone who knew the Fathers, knew Luther, and had mastered the whole history of Indian religion from scratch. What he wrote always had something new about it, he always went right to the bottom of things." No doubt one of the "things" he was referring to was Martin Luther's view of faith, which Hacker explores in this text. A unique contribution to ecumenical studies, *Faith in Luther* engages the primary texts of Luther, assessing them for how they reveal Luther's novel conception of faith and how the development of "reflexive faith" impacted Luther's spirituality and theology—and the world.

The *Lost Words* by composer James Burton takes its inspiration and text from the award-winning 'cultural phenomenon' and book of the same name by Robert Macfarlane and Jackie Morris: a book that was, in turn, a creative response to the removal of everyday nature words like acorn, newt and otter from a new edition of a widely used children's dictionary. Both the book and Burton's 32-minute work, which is written in 12 short movements for upper-voice choir in up to 3 voice parts (with either orchestral or piano accompaniment), celebrates each lost word with a beautiful poem or 'spell', magically brought to life in Burton's music. At its heart, the work delivers a powerful message about the need to close the gap between childhood and the natural world. Burton's piece was co-commissioned by the Hallé Concerts Society for the Hallé Children's Choir and the Boston Symphony Orchestra. The piano accompaniment version was premiered at the Tanglewood Festival in 2019 by the Boston Symphony Children's Choir, of which Burton is founder and director. The Hallé Children's Choir will premiere the orchestral version of the full work in Manchester,

UK, post-pandemic. Vocal Score Co-commission by Boston Symphony and Hallé Concerts Society for their respective Children's Choirs. Two versions - with orchestral or with piano accompaniment. The vocal score is the same for both versions. James Burton is a composer but also a conductor. He is conductor of the Tanglewood Festival Chorus and choral director of the Boston Symphony. The book *The Lost Words*, exquisitely designed, has won multiple awards and is an international best-seller. The vocal score includes Jackie Morris's beautiful imagery in its cover design.

Your Brain Knows More Than You Think Westminster John Knox Press

Danielle Glus examines how urban housing governance reacts to the onset of urban growth in an internationally comparative perspective. The study is based on in-depth case studies of Washington, D.C., which is an example of primarily market-based interactions, and Vienna, which has traditionally pursued an active steering role of the local state. The author assesses the goals of urban development formulated by local actors and analyzes their translation into housing policies within the respective governance structures. She demonstrates that path dependence is an important feature of urban housing governance, with relationships, ideologies, and physical urban structures leading to stability. Even so, change is possible, as both systems integrate new policy elements. At the same time, both structures perpetuate inequality in the urban housing system by excluding some of the most disadvantaged groups from decision-making.
