It is not often that a publisher or an author or an artist has the opportunity to do something no one else has done before, something that is wholly new and original. Indiana from the Air is such a project. Never before has there been a systematic effort to photograph Indiana from above ground level from north to south and east to west. From the Ohio River to Lake Michigan and from the Wabash to Richmond, Fields and Huffman have captured the full variety of the Hoosier state, including natural areas, cityscapes, farm scenes, towns, factories, unique landforms, waterways, industry, the impact of the seasons, the art of a plowed field or a parking lot, an eagle's eye view of an eagle, the immensity of the land and also its fragility, the meander at New Harmony, the countryside as 'dream ... and much more. Ninety-seven magnificent full-color illustrations provide a new visual perspective of Indiana. Anyone with the slightest curiosity about this place called Indiana will want to own and study this lavish volume. All of the images have been selected for their artistic quality as well as their content, and many of them go beyond mere representation to a philosophical and even spiritual dimension. Painting Indiana, published in 2000 to popular acclaim and now available in paperback, represents the best work of a group of contemporary Hoosier landscape painters. It was commissioned by the Indiana Plein Air Painters Association to document the beauty of the state of Indiana at the turn of the new millennium. Each of the five artists was assigned a group of counties; all 92 counties are represented in the book. These present-day painters are inspired by the same vision as the renowned Hoosier Group, which included artists such as T. C. Steele and J. Ottis Adams, who painted Indiana at the close of the 19th and into the early part of the 20th centuries. There is great variety in these portraits of Indiana: traditional landscapes, village and urban scenes, the woodland dream, lakes and rivers, all offering a rich mixture of scenes and styles worthy of a complex and beautiful state. The artists comment briefly on their work, and Earl L. Conn provides short histories of each county.

**Air Pollution** Purdue University Press

Clarence "Cap" Cornish was an Indiana pilot whose life spanned all but five years of the Century of Flight. Born in Canada in 1898, Cornish grew up in Fort Wayne, Indiana. He began flying at the age of nineteen, piloting a "Jenny" aircraft during World War I, and continued to fly for the next seventy-eight years. In 1995, at the age of ninety-seven, he was recognized by Guinness World Records as the world's oldest actively flying pilot. The mid-1920s to the mid-1950s were Cornish's most active years in aviation.

During that period, sod runways gave way to asphalt and concrete; navigation evolved from the iron rail compass to radar; runways that once had been outlined at night with cans of oil topped off with flaming gasoline now shimmered with multicolored electric lights; instead of being crammed next to mailbags in open-air cockpits, passengers sat comfortably in streamlined, pressurized cabins. In the early phase of that era, Cornish performed aerobatics and won air races. He went on to run a full-service flying business, served as chief pilot for the Fort Wayne News-Sentinel, managed the city's municipal airport, helped monitor and maintain safe skies above the continental United States during World War II, and directed Indiana's first Aeronautics Commission. Dedicating his life to flight and its many ramifications, Cornish helped guide the sensible development of aviation as it grew from infancy to maturity. Through his many personal experiences, the story of flight nationally is played out.

**Final Report of the Indiana Environmental Policy Commission to Governor Robert D. Orr and the Indiana General Assembly** Indiana University Press

In response to a congressional request, GAO evaluated Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and state efforts to control hydrocarbon emissions in southeastern Wisconsin, northeastern Illinois, and northwestern Indiana, to determine: (1) whether Illinois and Indiana are contributing to Wisconsin's ozone problems; (2) why the two states have not obtained EPA approval of their ozone control plans; (3) why EPA failed to develop plans for the two states; (4) whether the EPA process for determining air quality violations across state lines is useful for ozone; (5) whether EPA uniformly implements construction bans nationwide; and (6) whether factories within the three states emit significant amounts of hydrocarbons. GAO found that: (1) because of the complexity of ozone formation, EPA officials and the states were unable to determine the exact source of Wisconsin's ozone problems; (2) EPA officials and the states agreed that industrial pollution from Chicago and northwestern Indiana may have contributed to the ozone problems in two Wisconsin counties; (3) Illinois and Indiana disagreed with Wisconsin on the effects of their emissions on Wisconsin's ozone level; and (4) EPA believes that industrial emissions from Wisconsin could also be significantly polluting its air. GAO also found that: (1) EPA did not fully approve the Indiana and Illinois ozone control plans because they failed to implement federal requirements for vehicle inspection and maintenance programs; (2) both states passed legislation implementing the measures to reduce the levels of industrial pollutions affecting the ozone layer; (3) EPA proposed to ban the construction or modification of factories that would produce large amounts of ozone until it fully approved the states' ozone plans; and (4) Congress recently enacted legislation prohibiting EPA from imposing sanctions in ozone and carbon monoxide nonattainment areas until August 1988.
