Looking at travel writing by British women from the seventeenth century on, Karen R. Lawrence asks an intriguing question: What happens when, instead of waiting patiently for Odysseus, Penelope voyages and records her journey—when the woman who is expected to waitsets forth herself and traces an itinerary of her own? Lawrence ranges widely, discussing both fiction and nonfiction and traversing the genres of travel letters, realistic and sentimental novels, ethnography, fantasy, and postmodern narrative. In examining works as dissimilar as Margaret Cavendish's rendition of the Renaissance adventure narrative and Christine Brooke-Rose's postmodernist *Between*, she explores not only the significance of gender for travel writing, but also the value of travel itself for testing the limits of women's social freedoms and restraints. Lawrence shows how writings by Frances Burney, Mary Wollstonecraft, Sarah Lee, Mary Kingsley, Virginia Woolf, and Brigid Brophy reconceive the meanings of femininity in relation to such apparent oppositions as travel/home, other/self, and foreign/domestic. Despite the differences—historical, generic, political—among these writers, Lawrence maintains, they share common insights. Their accounts overturn the dichotomy between adventure and domesticity, demonstrating something illusory within both the stability of home and the freedom of travel.

De la jeune Hélène du Rempart des béguines au petit enfant muet d'Allegra, tous les héros de Françoise Mallet-Joris ont laissé dans notre mémoire un souvenir qu'elle a su rendre inoubliable. Ici, c'est tout un monde qu'elle nous peint, le monde du show-business qui reste pour beaucoup d'entre nous si mystérieux. Qui est Dickie-Roi ? "L'Archange de la chanson, celui qui chante l'amour", annoncent les affiches. Autour de ces nouveaux comédiens ambulants, directeurs artistiques, régisseurs, musiciens, etc., nous faisons connaissance avec le petit monde si mal connu des fans : jeunes ou moins jeunes, riches ou pauvres, et parfois presque enfants comme cette petite Pauline qui vit là à sa première grande aventure. Mais derrière Dickie-Roi il y a Frédéric Roy, le fils d'une commerçante de province, qui va se découvrir à nous, à travers les feux de la rampe et les bravos, avec ses doutes, ses nostalgies, ses ivresses, ses regrets, son innocence, et quand, victime d'une campagne de presse, l'idole en lui se sent menacée, la rupture s'accomplit et Frédéric ne supporte plus l'image de Dickie. Réfugié dans un château qui abrite une secte dirigée par un étrange personnage, Dickie n'arrive pas à assumer son destin, il est broyé par lui. Mais l'espoir est là, avec la petite Pauline, la jeune fan de seize ans qui, au cours de cet été tragico-comique, aura commencé à découvrir le monde. Aux couleurs de la tendresse, de l'humour et de la lucidité, le roman laisse un sillage tragique : comment ne pas craindre pour une société où le besoin d'amour ne peut s'assouvir qu'auprès des idoles ? Il fallait être une femme de coeur doublée d'un grand écrivain pour saisir, derrière des manifestations qui pourraient paraître puérides, la détresse des hommes et des femmes d'aujourd'hui, l'angoisse des jeunes qui, tentant de fuir un monde glacé, veulent encore aimer...

Although much has been written about how the novel relates to the epic, the drama, or autobiography, no one has clearly analyzed the complex connections between prose fiction as it evolved before 1800 and the literature of travel, which by that date had a long and colorful history. Percy Adams skilfully portrays the emergence of the novel in the fiction of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries and traces in rich detail the history of travel literature from its beginnings to the time of James Cook, contemporary of Richardson and Fielding. And since the recit de voyage and the novel were then so international, he deals throughout with all the literatures of Western Europe, one of the book's chief themes being the close literary ties among European nations. Equally important in the present study is its demonstration that, just as early travel accounts were often a combination of reporting and fabrication, so prose fiction is not a dichotomy to be divided into the "adult" novel on the one hand and the "childish" romance on the other, but an ambivalence -- the marriage of realism and romanticism. *Travel Literature and the Evolution of the Novel* not only shows the novel to be amorphous and changing, it also proves impossible the task of defining the recit de voyage with its thousand forms and faces. Often the two types of literature are almost indistinguishable; even before Don Quixote, Adams writes, many travel accounts could have been advertised as having "the endless fascination of a wonderfully observed novel." This study by Percy Adams will both modify opinions about the novel and its history and provide an excellent introduction to the travel account, a form of literature too little known to students of belles lettres.

Possessing one of the most vital voices in international letters, Maryse Condé added to an already acclaimed career the New Academy Prize in Literature in 2018. The twelfth novel by this celebrated author revolves around an enigmatic crime and the young man at its center. Dieudonné Sabrina, a gardener, aged twenty-two and black, is accused of murdering his employer--and lover--Lorraine, a wealthy white woman descended from plantation owners. His only refuge is a sailboat, La Belle Créole, a relic of times gone by. Condé follows Dieudonné's desperate wanderings through the city of Port-Mahault the night of his acquittal, the narrative unfolding through a series of multivoiced flashbacks set against a forbidding backdrop of social disintegration and tumultuous labor strikes in turn-of-the-twenty-first-century Guadeloupe. Twenty-four hours later, Dieudonné's fate becomes suggestively intertwined with that of the French island itself, though the future of both remains uncertain in the end. Echoes of Faulkner and Lawrence, and even Shakespeare's Othello, resonate in this tale, yet the drama's uniquely modern dynamics set it apart from any model in its exploration of love and hate, politics and stereotype, and the attempt to find connections with others across barriers. Through her vividly and intimately drawn characters, Condé paints a rich portrait of a contemporary society grappling with the heritage of slavery, racism, and colonization. *Magyar nemzeti bibliográfia*
