Using comic vision to address serious concerns of living, Penn has written a freewheeling novel that will surpass most readers' expectations of “ethnic fiction.” Instead of the usual polemics, it's

marked by a sense of humor and a playfulness of language that springs directly from Native American oral tradition. What more can be said about a book that has to be read to the end in order to get to the beginning? That Killing Time with Strangers is unlike any novel you have read before?
