 Anna Akhmatova (1889–1966), one of twentieth-century Russia's greatest poets, was viewed as a dangerous element by post-Revolution authorities. One of the few unrepentant poets to survive the Bolshevik revolution and subsequent Stalinist purges, she set for herself the artistic task of preserving the memory of pre-Revolutionary cultural heritage and of those who had been silenced. And indeed, this predication

became a reality: she is still remembered today, and not only remembered as some poet of the 20th century, but as an outstanding artist and an extraordinary woman. Without doubt she is to be considered as one of the most acclaimed writers in the Russian canon, and her work still has an impact today. Not only being a representative of the Silver Age and of Acmeism, but also living and writing under the shadow of Stalinism, her poetry is characterized by its very distinct style and has to be viewed in that special context. The major part of my essay will focus on Akhmatova's writing style and the significant character of her works. After giving a brief survey of her

biography, as well as a short summary about her work and style in general, I am going to analyze some parts of her poetry in particular, using selected pieces of work. The following questions are going to lead me throughout the whole essay: what is so specific about Akhmatova's poetry? In what way is her work representative of Acmeism? To what extent did her biographical circumstances and, even more importantly, the political situation in Russia influence her writing? How is her early work different from her later work? And why are her poems still so interesting for today's reading public?

the start of her career,
during the final years
of the Russian Empire,
Akhmatova was a
cultural celebrity who
fascinated a
generation not only
with her poetry but
also with the drama

that she created
around herself. After
the revolution of 1917,
she was attacked as a
decadent bourgeois
author and driven into
silence and obscurity.
Living in relative
poverty, with her
family and friends
repeatedly arrested
and harassed, and she
herself publicly cursed
by the representatives
of the state,
Akhmatova survived
the darkest decades of
Soviet history. Near the
end of her life, when
timorous cultural
bureaucrats allowed
her to reemerge as a
public figure, she
revealed to readers
that even if the
"collective" had
rejected her as an
unworthy member she
had continued to write
poetry reflecting the
trials and calamities of
Soviet men and women

with greater truth and moral authority than any official poet could attain.

'Evening' was Akhmatova's first publication and it brought her instant fame and success. In 1912, the Guild of Poets published her book of verse *Evening* (Večer) - the first of five in nine years. The small edition of 500 copies quickly sold out and she received around a dozen

positive notices in the literary press. She exercised a strong selectivity for the pieces - including only 35 of the 200 poems she had written by the end of 1911. (She noted that *Song of the Last Meeting*, dated 29 September 1911, was her 200th poem). The book secured her reputation as a new and striking young writer, the poems 'Grey-eyed king', 'In the Forest', 'Over the Water' and 'I don't need my legs anymore' making her famous. She later wrote "These naïve poems by a frivolous girl for some reason were reprinted thirteen times [...] And they came out in several translations. The girl herself (as far as I recall) did not foresee such a fate for them and used to hide the

issues of the journals in which they were first published under the sofa cushions".

Akhmatova saw the source of her creativity as the appearance to her of the Muse, the embodiment of poetic inspiration. In the
