applications. The last two chapters present various non-uniform results (Chapter 5) and outline the analytic approach that allows one to test and compare techniques used in previous chapters (Chapter 6).

In 1907, author, poet, essayist, and folk art historian Eliza Calvert

Hall (1856–1935) published *Aunt Jane of Kentucky*, a collection of stories about rural life infused with the spirit and gentle good humor of its elderly narrator, Aunt Jane. The First Conference on the History of Nordic Computing (HiNC1) was organized in Trondheim, in June 2003. The HiNC1 event focused on the early years of computing, that is the years from the 1940s through the 1960s, although it formally extended to year 1985. Compared to the early years of computing before 1960, where the number of computer projects and applications was small, capturing a holistic view of the history between the 1960s and

the 1980s is considerably more difficult.
