Quoting is all around us. But do we really know what it means? How do people actually quote today, and how did our present systems come

about? This book brings together a down-to-earth account of contemporary quoting with an examination of the comparative

and historical background that lies behind it and the characteristic way that quoting links past and present, the far and the near. Drawing from anthropology, cultural history, folklore, cultural studies, sociolinguistics, literary studies and the ethnography of speaking, Ruth Finnegan's fascinating study sets our present conventions into crosscultural
