But increasingly, our narrator finds it hard to keep up with Isora, who seems to be growing up at full tilt without her—and as her submissiveness veers into a painful sexual awakening, desire grows indistinguishable from intimate violence. Braiding prose poetry with bachata lyrics and the gritty humor of Canary dialect, *Dogs of Summer* is a story of exquisite yearning, a brutal picture of girlhood and a love song written for the vital community it portrays.
