In addition to multiple ground wars, the era pioneered drone strikes and industrial-scale digital surveillance; weakened the rule of law through indefinite detentions; sanctioned torture; and manipulated the truth about it all. These conflicts have yielded neither peace nor victory, but they have transformed America. What began as the persecution of Muslims and immigrants has become a normalized feature of American politics and national security, expanding the possibilities for applying similar or worse measures against other targets at home, as the summer of 2020 showed. A politically divided and economically destabilized country turned the War on Terror into a cultural—and then a tribal—struggle. It began on the ideological frontiers of the Republican Party before expanding to conquer the GOP, often with the acquiescence of the Democratic Party. Today's nativist resurgence walked through a door opened by the 9/11 era. And that door remains open. Reign of Terror shows how these developments created an opportunity for American authoritarianism and gave rise to Donald Trump. It shows that Barack Obama squandered an opportunity to dismantle the War

on Terror after killing Osama bin Laden. By the end of his tenure, the war had metastasized into a bitter, broader cultural struggle in search of a demagogue like Trump to lead it. ### **The Politics of Terror** Routledge

Terrorism kills far fewer Americans annually than automobile accidents, firearms, or even lightning strikes. Given this minimal risk, why does the U.S. continue expending lives and treasure to fight the global war on terror? In *Monsters to Destroy*, Navin A. Bapat argues that the war on terror provides the U.S. a cover for its efforts to expand and preserve American control over global energy markets. To gain dominance over these markets, the U.S. offered protection to states critical in the extraction, sale, and transportation of energy from their "terrorist" internal and external enemies. However, since the U.S. was willing to protect these states in perpetuity, the leaders of these regimes had no incentive to disarm their terrorists. This inaction allowed terrorists to transition into more powerful and virulent insurgencies, leading the protected states to chart their own courses and ultimately break with U.S. foreign policy objectives. Bapat provides a sweeping look at how the loss of influence over these states has accelerated the decline of U.S. economic and military power, locking it into a permanent war for its own economic security.

The terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001, were used by the Bush administration to usher in a war without borders, a war against many enemies in many different parts of the world, a war without end. Aktionen in die beiden Türme des World Trade Centers geflogen, was die Wolkenkratzer zum Einsturz brachte und tausende Menschen tötete. Eine weitere Maschine wurde ins Pentagon gesteuert, die vierte entführte Maschine sollte wahrscheinlich das Weiße Haus treffen, stürzte aber aufgrund eines Kampfes zwischen Entführern und Passagieren, die inzwischen von den anderen Anschlägen erfahren hatten, auf freiem Feld bei Shanksville, Pennsylvania ab. Nicht nur die Zahl der Opfer, 3066 Menschen verloren durch die Anschläge ihr Leben, sondern auch die Symbolik der ausgewählten Ziele und die mediale Multiplikation der Ereignisse könnten die Anschläge zu einem historischen Schlüsselereignis – vergleichbar dem Fall der Mauer oder dem Ende des II. Weltkrieges – machen. Von der damaligen US-Regierung unter Präsident George Bush wurden die Anschläge als Kriegserklärung begriffen, was diese ihrerseits veranlasste, einen War on Terror auszurufen. Dieser sollte nicht nur den Terroristen und ihren Netzwerken gelten, sondern auch jenen, „who harbor them and feed them and house them“. Gemeint war mit letzterem insbesondere das afghanische Taliban-Regime, dass im Verdacht stand, dem al-Qaida Terrornetzwerk einen Rückzugsraum zu bieten.
