In this accessible volume, Thomas R. Martin compares the writings of Herodotus in ancient Greece with those of Sima Qian in ancient China to demonstrate the hallmarks of early history writing. While these authors lived in different centuries and were not aware of each other’s works, Martin shows the similar struggles that each grappled with in preparing their historical accounts and how their efforts

helped invent modern notions of history writing and the job of the historian. The introduction’s cross-cultural analysis includes a biography of each author, illustrating the setting and times in which he worked, as well as a discussion of how each man introduced interpretation and moral judgment into his writing. The accompanying documents include excerpts from Herodotus’ *The Histories* and Sima Qian’s *Shiji*, which illustrate their approach to history writing and their understanding of their own cultures. Also featured are maps and illustrations, a chronology, questions to consider, and a selected bibliography.

After emigrating to New York in 1941, Castelli would not open a gallery for sixteen years, when he had reached the age of fifty. New York, thus became the unrivaled commercial institution in American art, producing a generation of acolytes, among them Mary Boone, Jeffrey Deitch, Larry Gagosian, and Tony Shafrazi. *Leo and His Circle* brilliantly narrates the course of one man's power and influence. But Castelli had another secret, too: his life as an Italian Jew. Annie Cohen-Solal traces a family whose fortunes rose and fell for centuries before the Castellis fled European fascism. Never hidden but also never discussed, this experience would form the core of a guarded but magnetic character possessed of unfailing old-world charm and a refusal to look backward—traits that ensured Castelli's visionary precedence in every major new movement from Pop to Conceptual and by which he fostered the worldwide enthusiasm for American contemporary art that is his greatest legacy. Drawing on her friendship with the subject, as well as an uncanny knack for archival excavation, Annie Cohen-Solal gives us in full the elegant, shrewd, irresistible, and enigmatic figure at the very center of postwar American art, bringing an utterly new understanding of its evolution.

The brutal struggles for dominance among Davidù's all male circle of friends; his strict but devoted grandmother, whose literacy is a badge of honor; his charismatic and manipulative great-uncle, who will become his trainer—the vicious scenes and sometimes unsympathetic characters Enia sketches land hard and true. *On Earth as It Is in Heaven* is both firmly grounded in what Leonardo Sciascia liked to call "Sicilitude" - the language and mentality of that eternally perplexing island - and devastatingly universal. A meditation on physical violence, love and sex, friendship and betrayal, boxing and ambition, Enia's novel is also a coming-of-age tale that speaks - sometimes crudely, but always honestly - about the joys and terrors of becoming a man.

Son dernier roman, *Brasyl*², lui valut le prix de la British Science Fiction Association en 2008. Ses autres livres comprennent les romans *Nécroville*, *Out on Blue Six*, *Hearts*, *Hands and Voices*, *Sacrifice of Fools*, *Chaga*, *Kirinya* et *River of Gods*, ainsi que deux recueils de nouvelles, *Empire Dreams* (traduit sous ce titre en français) et *Speaking In Tongues*. Un nouveau recueil, *Cyberabad Days*, qui rassemble ses nouvelles liées à l'Inde futuriste décrite dans *River of Gods*, vient de paraître. Né en 1960 à Manchester en

Angleterre, McDonald vit depuis longtemps en Irlande du Nord. Il réside et travaille aujourd'hui à Belfast.

The Poet Prince Canelo

Fougeret de Monbron (1706–1760) was a minor French writer known in Parisian literary circles in the 1740s and 1750s for his spoof of Voltaire's *Henriade*, entitled *La Henriade travestie* (1745). He is generally considered the model for 'LUI' in Diderot's fragmented novel *the Neveu de Rameau*, written some time after 1761. In addition to this, his travel memoirs, *Le Cosmopolite* (1750), are a recognized source of Voltaire's *Candide* (1759). Today, Monbron's novel on prostitution *Margot la ravaudeuse* (1753) (or *Margot, the stocking darning*) is his best known work. Widely read in France (where it has appeared in four separate editions since 1990), and moreover translated since the eighteenth century into other European languages, *Margot* has never been adequately made available to English-speaking readers. Professor Langille's new translation brings *Margot la ravaudeuse* for the first time to students of eighteenth-century literature, and most especially to those interested in that intriguing sub-genre known as 'prostitution narrative'. *On Earth as It Is in Heaven* Simon and Schuster

Paul Klee, the Swiss German painter influenced by expressionism, cubism and surrealism, also produced a number of etchings in his early years, beginning in 1903. These works, remarkable for their technical proficiency, illustrate his evolution from a traditionalist to one of modern art's most daring masters. Previously published in 1945 and 1947, this third revised edition was issued by the Museum of Modern Art and by Graphic Matter in 2013 in a limited edition of 500, printed and bound by

Trifolio, Verona. It beautifully reproduces each of Klee/s prints on fine paper, which are accompanied by original texts and an updated list of plates.
