I have printed here a considerable number of the questions I would ask, and the topics for exploration I would assign, on the play of Macbeth. It will be easy to think of knotty Shakespearian problems much more perplexing than any I have broached. I may say, however, that I have meant, by my queries, to indicate how far it seems to me in high schools desirable to push the discussion of Shakespearian difficulties.
