On March 14-18, 1983 a workshop on "Chemical Instabilities: Applications in Chemistry, Engineering, Geology, and Materials Science" was held in Austin, Texas, U.S.A. It was organized jointly by the University of Texas at Austin and the Universite Libre de Bruxelles and sponsored by NATO, NSF, the University of Texas at Austin, the International Solvay Institutes and the Exxon Corporation. The present Volume includes most of the material of the invited lectures delivered in the workshop as well as material from some posters, whose content was directly related to the themes of the invited lectures. In recent years, problems related to the stability and the nonlinear dynamics of nonequilibrium systems invaded a great number of fields ranging from abstract mathematics to biology. One of the most striking aspects of this development is that subjects reputed to be "classical" and "well-established" like chemistry, turned out to give rise to a rich variety of phenomena leading to multiple steady states and hysteresis, oscillatory behavior in time, spatial patterns, or propagating wave fronts. The primary objective of the workshop was to bring together researchers actively engaged in fields in which instabilities and nonlinear phenomena similar to those observed in chemistry are of current and primary concern: chemical engineering (especially surface catalysis), combustion (dynamics of ignition, flame stability), interfaces (emulsification, dendritic growth), geology (regularly repeated patterns of mineralization in a variety of space scales), and materials science (dynamical solidification, behavior of matter under irradiation).

Data analysis is important from two points of view: first, it enables a large mass of information to be reduced to a reasonable compass, and second, it assists in the interpretation of experimental results against some framework of theory. The purpose of this text is to provide a practical introduction to numerical methods of data analysis which have application in the field of experimental chemical kinetics. Recognizing that kinetic data have many features in common with data derived from other sources, I have considered it appropriate to discuss a selection of general methods of data analysis in the early chapters of the text. It is the author's experience that an outline of these methods is not always easy to locate in summary form, and that their usefulness is often not sufficiently appreciated. Inclusion of these methods in the early chapters has been aimed at simplifying discussion in the later chapters which are more particularly concerned with kinetic systems. By the provision of a number of worked examples and problems, it is hoped that the reader will develop a feeling for the range of methods available and for their relative merits. Throughout the text, the mathematical treatment has been kept relatively simple, lengthy proofs being avoided. I have preferred to indicate the 'sense' and usefulness of the various methods rather than to justify them on strict mathematical grounds.

The study of thermodynamics is often limited to classical thermodynamics where minimal laws and concepts lead to a wealth of equations and applications. The resultant equations best describe systems at equilibrium with no temporal or spatial parameters. The equations do, however, often provide accurate descriptions for systems close to equilibrium. Statistical thermodynamics produces the same equilibrium information starting with the microscopic properties of the atoms or molecules in the system that correlates with the results from macroscopic classical thermodynamics. Because both these disciplines develop a wealth of information from a few starting postulates, e. g. , the laws of thermodynamics, they are often introduced as independent disciplines. However, the concepts and techniques developed for these disciplines are extremely useful in many other disciplines. This book is intended to provide an introduction to these disciplines while revealing the connections between them. Chemical kinetics uses the statistics and

probabilities developed for statistical thermodynamics to explain the evolution of a system to equilibrium. Irreversible thermodynamics, which is developed from the equations of classical thermodynamics, centers on distance-dependent forces, and time-dependent fluxes. The force flux equations of irreversible thermodynamics lead are generated from the intensive and extensive variables of classical thermodynamics. These force flux equations lead, in turn, to transport equations such as Fick's first law of diffusion and the Nernst Planck equation for electrochemical transport. The book illustrates the concepts using some simple examples.
