What she discovered was shocking—not just about Terry, but about the international political machinations that occurred during the years of his captivity. *The Hostage's Daughter* is an intimate look at the effect of the Lebanese Hostage Crisis on Anderson's family, the United States, and the Middle East today. Sulome tells moving stories from her experiences as a reporter in the region and challenges our understanding of global politics, the forces that spawn terrorism and especially Lebanon, the beautiful, devastated, and vitally important country she came to love.
