trained in hearing confessions. *The Interrogation of Joan of Arc* traces Joan's conflicts with her interrogators not to differing political allegiances, but to fundamental differences between clerical and lay cultures. Sullivan demonstrates that the figure depicted in the transcripts as Joan of Arc is a complex, multifaceted persona that results largely from these cultural differences. Technology and increasing levels of education have exposed people to more information than ever before.
