The rational approach of public policies, representing the topic of the current publication, is or should be a steady feature of public policy making and implementing. We find the

origins of this approach both in key papers of political and administrative sciences, as well as in those concerning the theory of rational choice. The International Commission on Mathematical Instruction (ICMI) has, since the 1980s, conducted a series of studies into topics of particular significance to the theory and practice of contemporary mathematics education. Each ICMI Study involves an

international seminar, the "Study Conference", and culminates in a published volume intended to promote and assist discussion and action at the international, national, regional, and institutional levels. The ICMI Study running from 2000 to 2004 was on The Future of the Teaching and Learning of Algebra, and its Study Conference was held at The University of Melbourne, Australia from December to 2001. It was the first study held in the Southern Hemisphere. There are several reasons why the future of the teaching and learning of algebra was a timely focus at the beginning of the twenty first century. The strong research base developed over recent decades enabled us to take stock of what has been achieved and also to look forward to what should be done and what might be achieved in the future. In addition, trends evident over recent years have intensified. Those particularly affecting school mathematics are the "massification" of education—continuing in some countries whilst beginning in others—and the advance of technology.
