REGISTERED NURSES (RNS) ARE highly respected professionals that form the backbone of healthcare. Without a strong workforce of RNs, the daily

operations of healthcare would quickly grind to a halt. Few careers offer such challenging, yet rewarding work. Every time RNs go to work, they make a difference in people's lives - or even save lives - of newborns, the elderly, and everyone in between. As key members of the healthcare team, they perform a wide variety of tasks, such as administer medications, assist with surgery, help people cope with long-term illness, and provide health education. They also take care of patients in their homes as they recover from illness, surgery, or accidents. RNs power the healthcare system, ensuring that the many details involved in patient care flow smoothly. This includes much more than direct patient care and RNs are not confined to the bedside. Today's RNs handle case

management, conduct clinical research, and teach in nursing programs. They often supervise licensed practical nurses (LPNs) and nursing assistants. A registered nursing career also offers many opportunities to specialize in one or more areas of patient care. There are more than 100 specialties to choose from, such as surgical, pediatrics, oncology, emergency medicine, geriatrics, orthopedics, or rehabilitation. There are three routes to becoming a registered nurse. The shortest and most popular is a two-year nursing program known as an AND. Although two years is not much time to invest in such a solid career, it is

not easy to accomplish. This is a popular field and there is competition to get into nursing schools. Once admitted, students have to work hard to make it through the rigorous curriculum. Will there be a job waiting for those who manage to get trained and licensed? Registered nurses are everywhere and there are a growing number of working professionals. There are three million registered nurses in the US, which makes it the largest group of healthcare workers. Yet, that is not enough to fill the need. There has been a nursing shortage for decades, and the job growth rate for RNs continues to be much higher than for most other occupations. The high demand means a newly graduated registered nurse will have the opportunity to work practically

anywhere. Employers are offering good pay - as much as \$70,000 a year - even for those with less than a year of experience. That does not even include sign-on bonuses, benefits, and other perks. With advanced training, some nursing specialties pay over \$200,000 a year! A career in registered nursing offers a winning combination of job security, ease of entry, flexible work hours, good pay, and the opportunity to help others. It is also challenging, defined by hard work, long hours, and stressful situations. For the right type of person, however, there is no more rewarding career than being a registered nurse.

This paper analyzes the impact of the Medicaid patient subsidy and Certificate of Need (CON) cost containment programs on nursing home behavior. The analysis is complicated by the fact the both proprietary and "not for profit" nursing homes exist, and by the problem that quality is not directly observed. Medicaid pays for the care of the financially indigent by directly reimbursing nursing homes at a predetermined rate. As a result, nursing homes can price discriminate between patients who finance their care privately and patients whose care is financed by

Medicaid. Nevertheless, nursing homes are required to provide the same quality to both types of patients. Typically, Medicaid reimbursement rates are set by a cost plus method, where the reimbursement per patient is equal to average cost plus some return referred to as the Medicaid "plus" factor. Our results show that Medicaid policymakers face a trade-off between quality and the access of poor to nursing home care. Specifically, we find that increases in the Medicaid "plus" factor cause nursing homes to reduce quality and substitute Medicaid patients for "private pay" patients. These quality differences can be quite large. In fact, in our sample, we find that homes who receive high Medicaid "plus" factors provide hundreds of thousands of dollars less in goods and

services than homes who receive average Medicaid "plus" factors, *certris paribus*. CON attempts to control nursing home expenditures by limiting the supply of beds with capacity constraints and entry barriers. Our analysis shows that CON policy makers are forced to trade off containing the size of the industry (and therefore total Medicaid payments) against quality and access of the poor to nursing home care.

Specifically, we find that the capacity constraints and the reduced competition from the entry barriers lead to lower quality and fewer Medicaid patients receiving care
