The book's bright, gorgeous illustrations provide a detail-filled urban backdrop to Lucia's explanations and bring them fully to life for small children. This book can serve a dual purpose in the classroom as both a terrific read-aloud and a resource for information. The content aligns perfectly with the elementary social studies curriculum and would invite all kinds of

classroom discussions about who and what make up a community. It also provides terrific, potential assignment ideas for students to pay attention to what surrounds them where they live, play and go to school --- they would likely notice many things for the first time! The inclusion of the Senhor Da Pedra festival offers a terrific tie-in to a unit on celebrations of all kinds.
