 Act 3, Scene 4 The banquet is underway in the great hall of the royal palace Amidst the revelers, Macbeth sees the First Murderer and, as inconspicuously as possible, he walks over to speak with him The First Murderer tells him that the blood Macbeth sees upon his face is Banquo's and that Fleance has escaped
What is the theme for Act 4 in The Tragedy of Macbeth?
 While planning Duncan's murder, Lady Macbeth counsels Macbeth to "look like the innocent flower, / But be the serpent under't"—to "beguile the time" by disguising his motives behind a mask of loyalty (I v 61) After the murder, Lady Macbeth paints the bodyguards' faces with a mask of blood to implicate them
