of Soul. Tout au long d'une carrière qui a couvert six décennies, Brown est l'une des figures les plus influentes de la musique populaire du XXe siècle et est réputé pour ses performances scéniques. En 2004, le magazine Rolling Stone le classe à la septième place dans sa « list of the 100 Greatest Artists of All Time » . Après une période de prison pour cambriolage, James Brown commence sa carrière comme chanteur de gospel en Géorgie avant d'intégrer et de devenir la figure de proue d'un groupe de R&B vocal (The Famous Flames). Brown accède à une notoriété nationale à la fin des années 1950 avec des ballades comme Please, Please, Please et Try Me et se bâtit une réputation d'inlassable performeur scénique. Brown connaît son apogée dans les années 1960 avec des succès colossaux (Papa's Got a Brand New Bag, I Got You (I Feel Good) et It's a Man's Man's Man's World). À la fin des années 1960, Brown modifie son approche musicale, passant d'un mix musical fondé sur le blues et le gospel vers une approche africanisée qui jette les bases et ouvre la voie au développement de l'ensemble du courant funk. Au début

des années 1970, Brown a totalement établi le son du funk avec la formation des The J.B.'s et des enregistrements tels que Get Up (I Feel Like Being a) Sex Machine ou The Payback. Brown est également remarqué pour des titres à commentaire social, notamment avec le single Say It Loud - I'm Black and I'm Proud en 1968. Brown a continué à se produire et enregistrer jusqu'à son décès en 2006. Brown détient le record de l'artiste ayant placé le plus grand nombre de singles au sein du Billboard Hot 100 sans avoir jamais atteint la première place du classement. Il a toutefois classé 17 de ses titres en tête des « R&B charts ». Il aura notamment inspiré de futures célébrités dans l'histoire de la danse, dont Michael Jackson et Prince.

denounced the Constitution as a pro-slavery pact with the devil. From the “cold civil war” that pits partisans against one another to the modern secession movements in California and Texas, the divisions that threaten to tear America apart today have centuries-old roots in the earliest days of our Republic. Richly researched and persuasively argued, *Break It Up* will help readers make fresh sense of our fractured age.

A fascinating account of the music and epic social change of 1973, a defining year for David Bowie, Bruce Springsteen, Pink Floyd, Elton John, the Rolling Stones, Eagles, Elvis Presley, and the former members of The Beatles. 1973 was the year rock hit its peak while splintering—just like the rest of the world. Ziggy Stardust travelled to America in David Bowie’s *Aladdin Sane*. *The Dark Side of the Moon* began its epic run on the Billboard charts, inspired by the madness of Pink Floyd’s founder, while all four former Beatles scored top ten albums, two hitting #1. FM battled AM, and Motown battled Philly on the charts, as the era of protest soul gave way to disco, while DJ Kool Herc gave birth to hip hop in the Bronx. The glam rock of the New York Dolls and Alice Cooper split into glam metal and punk. Hippies and rednecks made peace in Austin thanks to Willie Nelson, while outlaw country, country rock, and Southern rock each pointed toward modern country. The Allman Brothers, Grateful Dead, and the Band played the largest rock concert to date at Watkins Glen. Led Zep’s *Houses of the Holy* reflected the rise of funk and reggae. The singer songwriter movement led by Bob Dylan, Neil Young, and Joni Mitchell flourished at the Troubadour and Max’s

Kansas City, where Bruce Springsteen and Bob Marley shared bill. Elvis Presley’s *Aloha from Hawaii via Satellite* was NBC’s top-rated special of the year, while Elton John’s albums dominated the number one spot for two and a half months. Just as U.S. involvement in Vietnam drew to a close, *Roe v. Wade* ignited a new phase in the culture war. While the oil crisis imploded the American dream of endless prosperity, and Watergate’s walls closed in on Nixon, the music of 1973 both reflected a shattered world and brought us together.

He also shows Davis's lighter side: cooking, prowling the streets of Manhattan, painting, riding his horse at his Malibu home. Troupe discusses Davis's musical output, situating his albums in the context of the times--both political and musical--out of which they emerged. *Miles and Me* is an unparalleled look at the act of creation and the forces behind it, at how the innovations of one person can inspire both those he knows and loves and the world at large.
