involved in human linguistic expression, the metaphor stands out as a concept of illustration and meaning-making that has been found in every human language studied so far. Despite their apparently universal use, metaphors are distinct in that they represent a preference of figurative language over literal and in many cases readily available terms. This is a peculiar behavior. The question begs to be asked why we use metaphors instead of literal expressions. What is the advantage of using metaphorical expressions and risk the failure of the utterance, instead of simply adhering to literal meaning of words? The cognitive processes and sequences of creating figurative language in the form of metaphors, as well as the environments that prompt the use of them, the choice

of locutionary partners in whose presence one might use a metaphor in speech - and what happens if we choose poorly - are all areas that must be examined deeper, and this thesis will attempt to answer some of these questions. I will be asking (and answering) the following questions: 1. How old is this metaphor?, 2. Who uses this metaphor?, 3. What is the purpose of this metaphor?, 4. Using data from five corpora as well as contributions from prominent sources in linguistics, psycholinguistics, cognitive science,

philosophy, anthropology, and psychology, all of which are intensely curious about and fascinated by metaphors, this metaphor will be scrutinized and examined. I will show that this metaphor was carefully crafted for marketing purposes rather than organically developed like most other metaphors.

metaphor and simile as if they mean exactly the same thing. But they are not! A simile is a metaphor, but not all metaphors are similes. A metaphor compares two things, and does so more directly without using as or like. For example, the shop was a little gold-mine. A simile compares (usually introduced by like or as) two things that are generally not alike--such as a line of migrant workers and a wave, or onion skins and a swarm of butterflies. Writers and authors use similes to explain things, to express emotion, or to make their writing more lively and entertaining. My dad liked figures of speech. "Any female dog can have pups," my father told me when my parents divorced, which made me a real son of a bitch. The Bible metaphors should consolidate into one big picture. Each one by itself will fail to reveal the gospel truth. The unified picture was unveiled to humanity for the first time, in the first century. It was then that God began to live with His people without regard to nationality or

location. This mystery was revealed two millennia ago. It united the people of God; who are called: the church, the temple, the bride, the nation, the holy city, the human body with Christ as head, the household of God and the children of God. It was then that God's people were about to receive the kingdom and rule in the millennium with Christ. So what happened? What's the literal truth? How can we make sense of it all? We even restarted our calendar to signify the dawning of this new creation. Which brings us to the most contentious church topic to date; eschatology. Obviously eschatology verses contain plenty of hard to nail down word pictures. If they were all scientific snapshots, we would all see eye to eye. The requirement to be born again in

order to see the kingdom is a graphic illustration that Nicodemus analyzed scientifically. He could not enter back into his mother's womb and be born again could he? And newborns can't see anything anyway. Are we supposed to just throw up our hands and say, "With God all things are possible". After all, a miracle by definition defies science and God is the God of miracles, therefore we can and should take everything scientifically, just like Nicodemus did. Isn't God primarily concerned with science as the way to rule creation with Him? Or should we search for the intended truth behind the figures of speech? Being born by the Holy Spirit was not covered in biology 101. Hyperbole is like hyperrealism whereas a metaphor is an abstraction. A parable is

then an extended metaphor and a story is an extended parable. But a story can be real, hyperreal or abstract and still convey a rational truth. It doesn't always have to be a scientific fact or historical story to convey a cognitive truth. The undeveloped mind of a child deals only in the concrete facts of the matter. A child is not born with innate ideas from which he can develop principles. He or she must first of all be introduced to certain hard facts based on the world around him, by the people who raise him. Appreciating the arts comes with maturity. Jesus expected adults to be able to think abstractly and He expected children to have great faith in those adults. When He told the woman at the well that He could give her water that caused her to never thirst again, she

noticed that Jesus didn't even have a bucket and the well was deep. When He said tear this temple down and I will rebuild it in three days, they thought He meant the concrete temple of the Holy Spirit, but He meant the body of Christ.

Oystein Lund gives a new approach to texts in Isaiah 40-55 that deal with ways and desert transformation. Earlier

exegesis has mainly read these texts in a literal way. In recent years, exegetes have pointed out that the so-called 'exodus texts' should rather be interpreted metaphorically. The author supports this, and accordingly seeks to continue this discourse by systematizing, intensifying, and deepening the argumentation for a metaphorical reading. He argues that most of the way-texts in Isaiah 40-55 are interrelated, and gradually contribute to explore questions regarding the way-situation of the people. The way-theme appears in the prologue, and in 40:27 a problem approach is established when the people is addressed: How can you say, O Jacob, and speak, O Israel, 'My way is hidden from the LORD, and my right passes by my God'? Several subsequent way-texts

are related to this text, and together these draw a coherent picture in which the problematic way-situation of the people in the past and present is transformed. JHWH establishes new ways in which he leads his people through their difficult landscape. Oystein Lund argues that such a coherent reading of the way-texts gives good meaning, which is consistent with the over all message of Isaiah 40-55.
