Writing in French in the 1950s,
Ferdinand Léopold Oyono (1929–2010)
had only a brief literary career, but his
anticolonialist novels are considered
classics of twentieth-century African
literature. Like Oyono’s *Houseboy*, also
available from Waveland Press, this
novel fiercely satirizes the false
pretenses of European colonial rule in
Africa. Meka, a village elder, has always
been loyal to the white man. It is with
pride that he first hears he is to receive
a medal. While waiting for the ceremony,
however, Meka’s pride gives way to
skepticism. At the same time, his wife
has realized that the medal is being
given to her husband as compensation
for the sacrifices they have made. The
events following the ceremony confirm
Meka’s new estimation of the white man.
Both subtle and oftentimes humorous,
this beautifully told story lays bare the
hollowness of the mission in Africa. It
fuels opportunities for discussing colonial

politics around class and race as well as
for exploring indigenous Cameroon life
and values.

This edited collection provides
unprecedented insight into the emerging
field of multilingual education in Sub-
Saharan Africa (SSA). Multilingual
education is claimed to have many
benefits, amongst which are that it can
improve both content and language
learning, especially for learners who may
have low ability in the medium of
instruction and are consequently
struggling to learn. The book represents
a range of Sub-Saharan school contexts
and describes how multilingual
strategies have been developed and
implemented within them to support the
learning of content and language. It
looks at multilingual learning from
several points of view, including
‘translanguaging’, or the use of multiple
languages – and especially African
languages – for learning and language-
supportive pedagogy, or the
implementation of a distinct pedagogy to
support learners working through the
medium of a second language. The book

puts forward strategies for creating materials, classroom environments and teacher education programmes which support the use of all of a student's languages to improve language and content learning. The contexts which the book describes are challenging, including low school resourcing, poverty and low literacy in the home, and school policy which militates against the use of African languages in school. The volume also draws on multilingual education approaches which have been successfully carried out in higher resource countries and lend themselves to being adapted for use in SSA. It shows how multilingual learning can bring about transformation in education and provides inspiration for how these strategies might spread and be further developed to improve learning in schools in SSA and beyond. Growing Up with Poetry East African Publishers

In the introductory chapter the editors highlight common and cross-cutting themes and propose appropriate, sometimes new terminology for the discussion of linguistic and cultural issues in education, particularly in low-income multilingual countries. Likewise, using examples from additional countries and contexts, the three final chapters address cross-cutting issues related to language and culture in educational research and development. Population and Development addresses important issues at the heart of the problems of developing countries. How these countries address the common difficulties of population growth, including mortality and fertility decline, population redistribution including internal migration and urbanization, and also international migration, for both source countries and for destination countries. How and why has population change affected development – both positively and negatively? How and why has development affected population change – both growth and distribution? The book opens with an introduction, preceding the ten substantive chapters, covering some of the broader issues for population studies and development

studies and the relationships between them. The first three chapters set out the main concepts and theoretical discussions on how population affects development and also how development affects population. Detailed chapters then cover each of the three main components of population change – fertility, mortality and finally migration. These are followed by chapters on the impacts of age structures, including the potential for a demographic dividend, and of the more qualitative aspects of human resource development through formal education and ICTs, with further chapters on population policies and population futures. The book incorporates illustrative text boxes and case studies on regions in Africa, the Middle East and Asia which elaborate the broader theoretical and conceptual substance of the ten major chapters. Each chapter has 'Discussion Questions' and 'Sources and Further Reading' sections, and there is an extensive integrated References section. The arguments of the book bring together a large but fairly loosely integrated literature from population studies, development studies and geography in a conceptually coordinated, empirically wide-ranging and challenging discussion. It is targeted at an audience in undergraduate courses in Geography and in Masters courses in Development Studies and Population Studies. The book's succinct but erudite structure means it can be used either as a course text book, or as a basic reference on a range of current issues and likely concerns at the interface between Geography, Development Studies and Population Studies.

Mr. Justice Barnabas Samatta retired from the Bench in July 2007 after a distinguished legal career spanning 41 years. Of the four decades of active life, he was a State Attorney, half of which he was the Director of Public Prosecutions. For the rest of the period, he was at then bench of the High Court of Tanzania and ten years in the Court of Appeal. At his retirement, he had spent seven years as Chief Justice of the country, thus at the helm of one of the three branches of the State. This book reproduces some of the leading judgements written by Justice Samatta. It highlights, in a critical fashion, some of his beliefs and observations as embedded in his decisions and speeches. This is to celebrate him as an example of an ethical lawyer whose integrity cannot be questioned, making him a worthy model for the younger generation to emulate and draw inspiration from. Justice Samatta's decisions touched on key areas of: Rule of Law and the Constitution, where he emphasised that the constitution crystallises a consensus among citizens as to the nature and character of their polity and governance;

Access to Justice, about which he believed that the doors to justice should be opened to all regardless of their station in life or economic position; Ethics, Integrity and Professionalism where he frequently quoted Nyerere 'There are some jobs in our society that can be done by unethical people...Being a judge or a magistrate is not one of these jobs...'; and Environmental Law where he argued 'The vulnerability of our planet has reached such a depressing degree that there is no greater service judges can render to mankind than playing their role in the protection of the environment...' He summarised his life-long conviction by saying: 'Let everyone in our society give justice a chance to prevail'.
