his writing. Fifty years on it is the writing both poetry and drama whose quality is being recognised and acclaimed, as recent performances of his plays suggest. Lorca's famous Gypsy Ballads were composed in the 1920s, when his poetic style was evolving from the traditional towards the surrealist. The combination of the ballad's perennial narrative format with startling and allusive imagery has intrigued readers ever since. The translations are broadly into free verse

 Federico García Lorca wrote the Gypsy Ballads between 1924 and 1927. When the book was published it caused a sensation in the literary world. Drawing on the traditional Spanish ballad form, Lorca

described his Romancero Gitano as 'the poem of Andalucía...A book that hardly expresses visible Andalusia at all, but where hidden Andalucía trembles'. Seeking to relate the nature of his proud and troubled region of Spain, he drew on a traditional gypsy form; yet the homely, unpretentious style of these poems barely disguises the undercurrents of conflicted identity never far from Lorca's work.

But the volume ends on a happier note, with "Optimism, Joy, Gentility," and such wonderful works as Helen Keller's *The Story of My Life*, Shaw's *Pygmalion*, Margaret Wise Brown's *Goodnight Moon*, and

Harper Lee's *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Illustrated throughout with imaginative paper cut-out murals by artist Diana Bryan, *The New York Public Library's Books of the Century* is a reflection of our times, featuring both the books we love--whether *The Cat in the Hat* or *Ulysses*--and books like *The Surgeon General's Report* or *Mein Kampf* that, for better or worse, have been an inescapable part of our century.
