 MORE THAN LOVE is a candid account of contrasting emotions - hope and lost hope, joy and despair, perseverance and helplessness - that resulted from parenting three Attachment Disorder adopted boys. It

also describes the adoptive parents' frustration at the system for not providing the help they were promised prior to the adoption. The book takes the reader through the emotional roller coaster experienced by both of the adoptive parents as they searched for answers from therapists, psychologists, social workers, clergy, teachers, friends, and family. It also provides explicit details of the boys' deviant behaviors and describes the behaviors observed by

outsiders. Others only witnessed charming, sweet, and "good" boys. Unfortunately, children with attachment problems are experts at manipulation and often dupe others, including those trained to detect such deceitfulness. Tragically, these adoptive parents finally had no choice but to let go of the boys in order to protect their family, friends, and society. one of the most poorly researched and understood mental disorders, and as a result, children and families continue to struggle with appropriate treatment options. Psychologists in both clinic and school settings are inadequately prepared to address the challenges that these children present. This study was designed to answer four broad questions about psychologists' training, knowledge, and assumptions regarding RAD; methods of

assessment and diagnosis; goals and approaches to treatment; and theoretical approaches. The study used a mixed-methods approach using quantitative survey questions (Phase 1) followed by qualitative individual interviews (Phase 2) as data sources. The participants for Phase 1 of the study included 44 clinic- and school-based psychologists, and participants for Phase 2 included seven psychologists who reported a significant

amount of knowledge of and experience with RAD on the survey. The results of this preliminary study indicate that clinic- and school-based psychologists had similar knowledge, level of training, and experience working with children with the disorder. In addition, psychologists in both settings use similar approaches to evaluating children who exhibit symptomology of RAD, although psychologists in school settings are less likely to diagnose children than those in clinic

settings. Intervention strategies most often utilized are behaviorally or social-cognitively oriented, but psychologists also use attachment-promoting therapies when treatment can consistently involve the parent or caregiver. Attachment work is less likely to happen in educational settings, despite many children with RAD receiving some or all of their treatment at school.
