Annotation This new edition of Larkin's poems for the first time presents his four published books, *The North Ship*, *The Less Deceived*, *The Whitsun Weddings* and *High Windows* in their original sequence.

Collected Poems and Selected Prose Faber & Faber

When Edward Thomas was killed at the Battle of Arras in 1917 his poems were largely unpublished.

But in the years since his death, his work has come to be cherished for its rare, sustained vision of the natural world and as 'a mirror of England' (Walter de la Mare). This edition, drawn from Thomas's manuscripts and typescripts as well as from his published works, offers an accessible introduction to this most resonant - and relevant - of poets. Günter Grass's

international fame as a novelist has tended to obscure his achievements in poetry, but his first book was a collection of poems and he has returned faithfully to the medium throughout his writing life. All his preoccupations - social, sexual, moral,

gastronomical - are found there, as is the unique mixture of expressionistic grotesquerie and political outspokenness that has characterised his fiction. It is this mixture, as Michael Hamburger, Grass's most constant and sympathetic translator, points out, that has allowed him to act as court jester to the post-war German democratic state, 'telling disagreeable truths'. Selected Poems 1956-1993 encapsulates one of the defining poetic oeuvres of our time.

This third edition of Alan Brownjohn's *Collected*

Poems was first published by the Enitharmon Press in 2006. It adds over 140 poems to the second, which appeared in 1988. This volume comprises all of the work that Brownjohn wishes to retain from his twelve individual collections published between 1954 and 2004; it also incorporates a number of newer uncollected poems. Wide-ranging in theme and displaying an impressive mastery of form, this body of writing firmly establishes Alan Brownjohn's achievement

Stephen Spender, along with his friends W. H. Auden, Louis MacNeice and C. Day Lewis, rose to prominence in the 1930s, writing powerfully of the fear and paranoia of a continent heading towards war. By the time of his death in 1995 he had established a distinguished reputation as a poet, critic, editor and translator. This New Collected Poems, edited by Michael Brett, gathers seven decades of verse from *Poems* (1933) to *Dolphins* (1994) and the late uncollected work.

Reordering the thematic principle of the 1985 *Collected Poems*, this edition returns to a book-by-book chronology and allows the reader to experience, for the first time, the full development and range of his career.

The selection of poems makes its own strong case for the continuing power and originality of this attractive, metropolitan and wholly individual

body of work.

The Waste Land & Other Poems London, Faber

This new anthology of poems, favourites from the nation's longest-running and best-loved request programme for verse, moves with the seasons, following the turning year from John Clare's 'pale splendour of the winter sun' to John Keats's 'Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness', by way of Larkin's 'young-leaved June' and Gerard Manley Hopkins' 'glassy peartree leaves and blooms' when 'Nothing is

so beautiful as Spring'. As the year changes, so we change with it. Since time out of mind our daily lives have been shaped and

directed by the seasons, and it is here that we find poems about harvest and hardship, growth and new life, the warmth of the life-giving sun, Christmas

and the closing of the year. Poetry Please: Seasonal Poems is a vital and generous gathering to treasure.
