parte psicótica y no
psicótica de la
personalidad y en la
última parte de su obra
postuló como objetivo del
psicoanálisis, además del
conocerse a sí mismo, el
devenirse auténtico, el
devenirse sí mismo. La

riqueza de sus hipótesis, la amplitud de sus teorías y la flexibilidad de sus modelos, agregadas al consejo de instalarse "sin memoria, sin deseo y sin entendimiento" en la tarea de observación e investigación clínica, apuntan a estimular la capacidad creativa de los analistas, como si les dijera "atrévase a pensar por sí mismos". Bion habla de las dificultades para expresar ideas nuevas con palabras conocidas y explica que esto lo lleva a veces a introducir términos desprovistos

intencionalmente de significado, como alpha y beta, o a utilizar palabras conocidas con significados estipulados por él. Para él la comunicación lateral es muy mala; si el objeto -es decir el paciente- está allí, uno puede señalar esa realidad compartida con el paciente, que está presente en la sesión. En cambio es muy difícil, si no imposible, cuando se trata de transmitir lo que ocurrió en la sesión a los colegas analistas, que no están presentes en ese análisis, en esa sesión, puesto que la experiencia

Bion's life spanned key events in the twentieth century. Born in India in 1897, he came to boarding school in England aged 8 and at 18 fought in the tanks in World War One. He trained as a doctor between the wars and, in his World War Two work for the army, he was an innovator. After the war, he became a patient of Melanie Klein, qualified as a psychoanalyst, and was part of an extraordinary period in psychoanalysis of work with psychotic mechanisms in patients.

In the late 1950s, he identified the configuration container/contained as being at the heart of human development. He looked outside of psychoanalysis to philosophers, scientists, mathematicians, and even theo-mystical thinkers. His work evolved radically throughout the 1960s and, at age 70 when many would be thinking of slowing down, he emigrated to California and began to travel internationally, giving lectures and supervisions

across three continents. After Freud, Bion appears to be the most quoted psychoanalyst of our time and this book provides the opportunity, even for those familiar with his work, to gain insight into its sheer breadth, showcased so brilliantly in this slim volume. As author of *Bion: 365 Quotes*, Nicola Abel-Hirsch's immersion in Bion's vast oeuvre has enabled a comprehensive introduction to Bion and his work. Her lightness of touch, whilst retaining the necessary depth, makes it

a joy to read. Bion and his work can be somewhat enigmatic but Abel-Hirsch's understanding offers the ideal introduction to the man and his work.

Shortly before and during World War II many European psychoanalysts found refuge in South

America, concentrated in Buenos Aires. The questions of what psychoanalysis is, and does, and who can and should practice it, remains key within the modern profession.
