Panicked crowds rushed for the few exits, but in minutes, the tent collapsed on those still struggling to escape below. A total of 168 lives were lost, many of them children, with many more injured and forever scarred by the events.

Hartford and the surrounding communities reeled in the aftermath as investigators searched for the source of the fire and the responsible parties.

Gold's recruit cased the rare-book room for weeks, searching for a weakness. When he found one, he struck, leading to a breathtaking game of wits between Gold and NYPL special investigator G. William Bergquist. Both a fast-paced, true-life thriller, *Thieves of Book Row* provides a fascinating look at the history of crime and literary culture.
