practices of fourth-grade teachers on the North Carolina Fourth Grade Writing Assessment and local, county-wide writing assessments by collecting data from 13 elementary schools in a rural school system (p. 4) in western North Carolina. -- Qualitative and quantitative data were collected. Analysis of the data revealed the validity of the scores given at the county level by the classroom teachers using the N.C. Fourth Grade Writing Assessment Rubric. Analysis of the data collected by the fourth-grade teachers through the surveys, interviews, and focus group revealed common writing-instruction strategies throughout the county and the impact self-efficacy played in writing instruction and the use of rubrics.
